This shift, seven years following the program's founding, represents the next phase of EGH's mission to uncover what works in global health. The foundation's expertise, resources, and network will provide a launch pad for EGH's next stage of growth, enabling it to scale its work.

EGH started as an idea sketched on the back of a napkin and has since evolved into a robust, global coalition of partners committed to investigating and spotlighting positive outliers in health. Together, we've created a forum for sharing best practices across 15 topics from 35 countries (and counting) and developed interactive tools to support decision-making among health leaders and funders. Our repository of lessons learned has also equipped governments with data-supported insights to set priorities and develop policies and programs that accelerate progress.
