HIV Vaccine Awareness Day marked an opportunity for reflection on how the trajectory of the virus, since its discovery in 1981, compares to that of COVID-19, today.

Like in the infancy of the HIV/AIDS epidemic, the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic were beset by uncertainty, misinformation, and fear. But unlike the case of HIV/AIDS, the world no longer awaits a COVID-19 vaccine.

The existence of a vaccine, however, is not enough to stop the spread. Katie Bollbach and her colleagues at Partners In Health explain why prioritization is among the better ways to create access to immunization.

An aggressive and robust data strategy and an ambitious all-hands-on-deck approach can also be a key differentiator in containing COVID-19, as South Africa's Dr. Saadiq Kariem, Chief of Operations at Western Cape Department of Health, explains.

I'm also happy to share that The Rockefeller Foundation has awarded a \$400,000

USD grant to The Johns Hopkins Center for Health Security at the Bloomberg School of Public Health to partner with Exemplars in Global Health to identify and showcase successful country responses to COVID-19 in Asia and Latin America, complementing the research led in Africa by Makerere University School of Public Health. This research will help us learn from one another, and in doing so, improve our global outbreak response capabilities.
