Dear Friend,

The kids will save us.

I've always found it to be a funny saying. On one hand, it puts pressure on our children, absolving adults of what should be our responsibilities. On the other, youth has long been synonymous with hope, so perhaps there is some truth to the statement.

Wherever you lean on the debate, though, being on the heels of World Children's Day reminds us that improving children's welfare must be top of mind for adults, if we expect our kids will carry the torch.

In the recent UNICEF webinar Making Better Decisions for Nutrition: Understanding Positive Outliers to Reducing Stunting, Dr. Zulfiqar Bhutta, from The Hospital for Sick Children, Dr. Víctor Aguayo, from UNICEF's Nutrition and Child Development Program, Dr. Baseer Achakzai, from Pakistan's Ministry of National Health Services, and Dr. Richard Kajura, from Makerere University School of Public Health, joined 140 experts from around the world to share why prevention and partnership are both essential strategies to improving child nutrition outcomes.

In Afghanistan, maternal mortality has recently declined from 1,600 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births to 400. Though this rate is still among the highest in the world, Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health researcher Dr. Nadia Akseer points out that delivering time-sensitive, facility-based care, even in conflict settings, can result in positive gains for moms and babies alike.

And in Zambia, Zambia Emory HIV Research Project Director Dr. William Kilembe said the country's RED – or Reaching Every District – strategy ensured every child that required immunization got vaccinated, making the country an exemplar in increasing DTP3 coverage to 91 percent between 2000 and 2017.

Our efforts to protect our children give me hope, personally. At the end of the day, whether the kids will ultimately save us might not be as important a question as whether we can save them first.

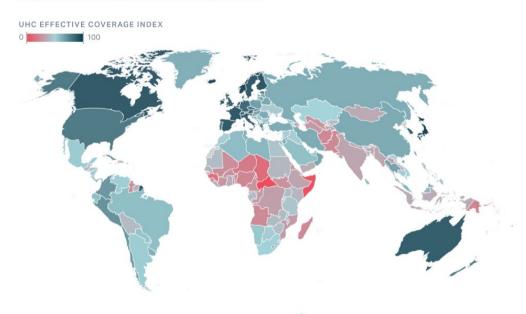
